#### Intended outcomes

The majority of pupils on the PDG register will benefit from a wide range of extracurricular experiences, including school trips, instrumental lessons, and participation in school committees. The school will provide support and contribute to the cost of these activities to ensure equal access for all.

#### Interventions:

Targeted interventions will address the individual needs of pupils, supporting those affected by the impact of the pandemic to catch up and strive toward achieving parity with their peers.

### Equal Access to Enrichment Opportunities:

All pupils on the PDG register will have the opportunity to attend school trips and residential courses throughout the year, ensuring they enjoy the same experiences and benefits as any other pupil in the school.

### Social and Communication Development:

Pupils will develop socially by participating in school committees and group activities, building confidence, collaboration, and effective communication skills.

#### **Development of Life Skills:**

Extracurricular experiences will help pupils build essential life skills, including organisation, teamwork, motivation, and a strong work ethic—preparing them for academic success and life beyond school.

# Personal Growth and Community Integration:

School interventions will support the personal development of each pupil, ensuring they feel included in the school community and have access to equal social opportunities alongside their peers.

#### **Monitoring and Ensuring Participation:**

The school will maintain records and monitor the participation of PDG-registered pupils to ensure that every child benefits from these experiences, enabling targeted support where necessary.

### Activity in this academic year

#### **Literacy Sessions:**

Deliver additional targeted literacy sessions for PDG-registered pupils, utilising staff time and salary contributions. These sessions will focus on key areas such as spelling, writing, and reading comprehension, ensuring measurable academic progress for each pupil.

#### **Support for Extracurricular Experiences:**

Ensure PDG pupils have access to extracurricular activities, including school trips, instrumental lessons, and participation in school committees. Staff involvement will ensure these opportunities are delivered safely and inclusively, supporting pupils' social development and life skills.

#### **Monitoring and Coordinating Progress:**

Allocate staff time to monitor and coordinate pupils' progress across both academic sessions and extracurricular experiences. This will ensure every pupil benefits fully from the opportunities provided, promoting equal access, personal development, and full participation in school life.

Intervention data shows that the majority of pupils are making clear progress in their literacy and spelling abilities, with noticeable improvement evident in pupils' books and written tasks.

This includes therapeutic activities such as Lego and Art therapy, as well as the 'Cwtsh Club' with drop-in sessions where pupils can receive support in a safe and nurturing environment.  The majority of pupils develop a positive understanding of their mental health and know who to turn to when they need help, strengthening their ability to manage their emotions and positively impacting their overall wellbeing.

School Uniform Stand Available for School Families	All pupils have access to the school's uniform.
Drop-in sessions for vulnerable parents, along with information sessions/coffee mornings with specialist teachers.	Parents will have the opportunity to meet with specialist teachers, receive detailed information about the available provision, and explore practical strategies to support their children at home. These meetings will provide a supportive environment where parents can ask questions, share experiences, and learn how to strengthen their children's wellbeing and learning effectively.
Contribution towards the costs of extracurricular activities.	Every pupil at the school has an equal opportunity to take part in extracurricular experiences that build confidence and develop new skills. This includes participation in additional courses, educational trips, extracurricular and instrumental lessons, as well as clubs and other external activities. Through these experiences, pupils are encouraged to explore new interests, build self-esteem, and develop social and communication

skills within a supportive and stimulating
environment.

# Part B: Review of Results from the Previous Academic Year PDG Outcomes

This provides details of the impact our PDG activities had on pupils during the 2024 to 2025 academic year.

Activity	Impact
The majority/all pupils to make progress in their reading skills.	Of the 18 pupils who took the Welsh reading assessment, 14 achieved a progress score of over 1000. Of the 19 pupils who took the English reading assessment, 11 pupils received a progress score over 1000. Every Reception to Year 2 pupil (except for 2 pupils identified with Additional Learning Needs) made progress in their reading assessments / Tric a Chlic. The school has once again invested in the Darllen Co and Bugs Online platforms, which enable every child to access Welsh reading books and materials both at school and at home, providing continuous opportunities to develop reading skills in a comfortable and supportive environment.
Most pupils show increasing confidence in their learning, developing independence and perseverance when facing new tasks.	Consistent monitoring ensures that pupils are confident in their learning and able to express their ideas clearly, making successful progress in their work. Lesson observations, pupil discussions, and questionnaires have confirmed clear progress in their independent skills and their ability to persevere when faced with challenging tasks. Outdoor lessons have also played an important role in strengthening these developments, providing practical and engaging experiences that help pupils build both confidence and practical skills.
Most pupils have had access to intervention and support programmes in Literacy and Numeracy.	This includes programmes such as Cychwyn Eto, Sound Discovery, Handwriting Motorway, WellComm, POPAT, Language/Speech Link, ELSA, Talkabout, and Lego Therapy (emotional and social literacy), along with other small-group interventions, additional technologies, and language support work. Data shows that these initiatives have had a significant and sustainable impact.

Contribute towards the cost of extracurricular activities	In addition, funding has been used to train staff in new, evidence-based techniques designed to raise standards in learning and support, including the ELSA Profile and One Page Profile. These programmes are delivered externally and provide targeted support, helping to develop pupils' individual needs and ensuring that progress in their literacy and numeracy skills is sustained over time.  This year, the school has made a significant contribution towards the cost of a variety of pupil activities, including trips to Llangrannog, Maes y Fron, the Urdd Centre, Cardiff, theatre performances, instrumental lessons, and class outings. In most cases, the school has paid up to 60% of the costs, and in some instances, it has fully funded the price to ensure that every pupil can take part. It is pleasing to note that every pupil on the register has
	attended all trips and residential courses, ensuring that all pupils have had full access to these experiences without financial barriers.
Hold regular second-hand clothes sales.	The school has organised six second-hand clothing collections this year, ensuring that every family has access to school uniform. While the school encourages contributions where possible, families in need have been able to receive second-hand uniform free of charge. This initiative has helped support families from all backgrounds, ensuring that every pupil can attend school with the appropriate equipment, free from financial barriers, while also promoting a cohesive and inclusive school community.

Last year, the Pupil Development Grant for Children in Care (PDG-CLA) was used to enable a Play Therapist to support six learners. Regular sessions were held, tailored to meet each individual's emotional and behavioural needs. Improvements were observed in learners' confidence, communication skills, and ability to manage their emotions within the learning environment. Staff feedback also highlighted the positive impact of the intervention on the overall wellbeing of the learners.
